New Learning for Year 4

- Make predictions about Scandinavia's climate based on its geographical location
- Use atlases, graphs and charts to explore the climate in Scandinavia
- Understand why parts of Scandinavia have no sunlight during parts of winter and no darkness during parts of summer.
- Use geographical sources such as atlases and photographs to explore the physical features of Scandinavia, including glaciers, fjords, mountains, lakes and waterfalls.
- Use geographical sources such as atlases and photographs to explore aspects of the human geography of Scandinavia.
- Identify similarities & differences between the three countries of Scandinavia, focusing on aspects of human geography.
- Compare & contrast an area in the UK with an area in Scandinavia.
- Understand & describe key aspects of settlements & land use across Scandinavia.



Capital city	The city where a country's government is located.
City	A very large settlement where a large number of people live and work
compass,	An instrument for showing direction
country	A large area of land where people live, that is run by the same government
European	Relating to the characteristics of countries in Europe, objects, people
Human geography	Explores the links between people, place and the environment in a specific location
Physical geography	Explores the natural processes that shape the Earth's surface.
settlement	A place where people have built homes to live in.
